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
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s the title suggests, this book is not directed at readers with a particular religious affiliation but is meant for

anyone who wishes to reflect on what famous thinkers throughout the ages have written about the human condition. No one can deny that despite temporary flashes of happiness, on the whole, the human condition is far from satisfactory. Human beings have always dreamed of attaining perfect happiness by transcending human problems, generally without much success. However some great thinkers, widely separated in time and space have pondered over how this human condition can be understood and how happiness can be attained. They were able to crystallise these thoughts into clear, apt sayings which sound simple at first sight, but which draw deep from the well springs of human experience. This book is a collection of these thoughts and readers are invited to share them and benefit from them. By reflection, the reader gains an understanding of his or her condition and is thus enabled to live a happier more meaningful life. Most of our

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problems arise from the fact that we do not understand the cause of our feelings of discontent and unsatisfactoriness.

Human beings are creatures driven by desires. They are constantly seeking to gratify the various demands made by their six senses: smell, hearing, taste, touch, sight and mind. In Buddhism these needs are classified, under four categories. It is stated that the human beings need four kinds of sustenance to satisfy:

- The body
- The senses
- The mind
- The consciousness

As can be readily perceived, the satisfaction of the demands made by the body and the senses are considered coarse and base because even animals have these needs. The satisfaction of the demands made by the mind caters for our natural curiosity about the world around us. This knowledge is then utilised by science and

technology to make life more comfortable for us in a physical sense but creature comforts cannot give us ultimate happiness because they do not satisfy our 'self-actualisation' needs.

To find meaning in our existence and to transcend the human condition, we need answers to the great existential questions: Who am I? What am I doing here? Am I needed? However, simply giving academic answers to those questions cannot give a person lasting happiness.

Happiness can only be gained by completely purifying one's consciousness and removing the defilements of restlessness, doubt and worry. Empirical knowledge of the world can be used to help one prepare for the real task of 'cooling down the fires of restlessness' which are the root cause of our sufferings.

This book therefore has two functions:

- To provide an enjoyable means to obtain knowledge about the human condition as perceived by the world's great thinkers and
- To encourage the reader to embark on a journey to purify the consciousness and

thereby achieve ultimate and lasting happiness.

The quotations in this book are the sayings of the founders of several religions and also different religious teachers as well as great philosophers, thinkers, scientists, historians, psychologists, politicians, free thinkers and some other publications, too. Their names and references are given in many places. There are many other sayings in this book where references are not given. Most of them are extracted from the books written by the compiler of this book. Each chapter is preceded by comments representing the thoughts of the compiler on the subject.

"Food for the Thinking Mind" is to be treated as a handy reference book to be read over and over again. It can be read when one has a few moments to spare, or just before retiring to bed. It is meant to sharpen one's understanding of the human condition, to make one think clearly about issues such as honest success, wealth, happiness, sorrow, birth, and death. However it

is only the 'food'. It cannot be left on a plate. It has to be taken by one in small amounts and digested properly to give strength and vitality to the spirit.

Hopefully, if compassion and Right View will not save the world, then at least the same selfishness and desire for self-preservation and self-gratification will force man to give some sensible thought to our impoverished environment and our suffering fellow-creatures on this earth.


To understand the place of man in the universe from a Buddhist point of view, we must first of all look at the Buddha's views on the cosmos. According to him, the Universe is to be understood in terms of a vast cosmic space. His teaching categorised the whole universe into three groups: planets with living beings, planets with elements and space itself.

We can see man as a specially favoured creature that had come into existence to enjoy the pleasures of a specially formed planet at the centre of the universe. Buddhism views man as tiny beings not only in strength but also in life span. Man is no more than just another creature but with intelligence that inhabits the universe.

Biologically, humans are weaker than any other beings big or small. Other animals are born armed with some sort of weapon for their own protection and survival. Humans, on the other hand, have their minds for everything but not as a weapon. Humans are regarded as cultured living beings because they are to harmonise with others but not to destroy them. Religion was discovered by them for this purpose. Every thing that lives share the same times force which energizes man. They are part of the same cosmic energy which takes various forms during endless rebirths, passing from human to animal, to divine form and back again, motivated by the powerful craving for existence (the survival instinct) which takes them from birth to death and to rebirth again in a never-ending cycle called samsara. The three detrimental sources of man which bind him to samsara are Greed, Hatred and Delusion.

This cycle can only be broken irrevocably through the development of Wisdom which destroys these fetters and puts an end to craving. Our shared fate as beings who inhabit this planet is that we all want desperately to go on living.

All things depend on each other for their existence. A man cannot see himself as different from (let alone being superior to) other beings because his body is solely dependent on food, which means he is dependent on plants, water, oxygen, etc. for his existence. At the same time his mind also exits dependently because the existence of thoughts rely on sense data which are derived from the external world of objects and persons. The whole universe must be seen as an immensenet: if only one knot in it is shaken, the whole net vibrates. Man owes allegiance to the world because he is dependent on it for his existence both physically and mentally.





odern discoveries are confirming what the Buddha had realised twenty-five centuries ago: that the mind is not a

thing or an entity with a separate existence but that, which arises dependent on conditions.

It is an energetic intelligent force, which arises in an individual and which can be cultivated to develop positive values such as kindness, sympathy, compassion, and love. These values can be utilised to serve the world. A powerful mind, fully developed, like that of a Buddha's can even purify the atmosphere. On the other hand, when abused by developing negative qualities like hatred, greed, jealousy, and ill-will it can become a potent destructive force. A mind like Hitler's, Idi Amin's, or Pol Pot's can be a source of great misery and suffering to living beings. On a smaller scale, individual humans can also create sufferings to those around them. A mind, which is not properly guarded and trained, can become a dangerous force.

In modern times, great minds are being exerted to discover many truths about the

workings of the universe through science. But if these discoveries are allowed to be used by untrained minds, great havoc can result. We only have to consider how the discovery of nuclear fission led to the creation of the most horrible weapons of destruction in our own time. The human mind is capable of great achievements that benefit all human beings, but conversely, it can also be the source of untold sufferings. In trying to explain the tremendous power of the mind, Einstein had said, "Science may have split the atom but it cannot control the mind." What he meant was that mental energy was far more powerful than atomic energy.

The only way this tremendous energy can be harnessed and controlled, is by adopting the age-old mind controlling techniques developed by the ancient sages of the past, like the Buddha. In his teachings, the Buddha analysed the workings of the human mind, its function and its development. He then showed how, given proper spiritual guidance, the mind can be directed to work for the benefit of all living things.



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nowledge is something which has been defined as 'justified true belief', and which is studied in the branch of

philosophy known as epistemology. The quest for knowledge knows no boundaries. There is no limit to pursuing knowledge, because knowledge is clearly different from 'feeling sure' about what exists or about the course of events. Most philosophical debate on the subject centres on the nature of truth and on what counts as appropriate evidence for claiming to know something. In Buddhist teaching, there are three sources of knowledge: Inference, Perception and Experience.

Knowledge of how things work is quite different from realisation which is wisdom, which is insight, which wants to see why it works, and how it works. Wisdom is so much more than knowledge. Knowledge is the answer to the question how? Wisdom is investigation of the answer to the question why? Knowledge can answer a query about function, result, and purposes: wisdom does not provide an answer, but is realising why such a question has arisen.

And in that realisation of the question, there is no search beyond because insight has solved the problem, dissolved the conflict and ended the search. Thus, where knowledge searches outside, wisdom ceases at the insight into the question.

The Buddha was once asked as to whether without sensuous pleasure life would be endurable; without belief in immortality man could be moral and without worship of a God man could advance towards righteousness. The Buddha replied in the affirmative and mentioned that these ends could be attained by knowledge; knowledge alone was the key to the higher path, the one worth pursuing in life; knowledge was that which brought calmness and peace to life, which rendered man indifferent to the storms of the phenomenal world.



uddhahood is not reserved only for the chosen people or for the supernatural beings. Anyone can become a Buddha.

No founder of any other religion ever said that his followers could have the opportunity or potentiality to attain the same position as the founder.

However, attaining Buddhahood is the most difficult task a person can pursue in this world. One must work hard by sacrificing one's worldly pleasures. One has to develop and purify one's mind from evil thoughts in order to this enlightenment. It will take innumerable births for a person to purify himself and to develop his mind in order to become a Buddha. Long periods of great effort are necessary in order to complete the high qualification of this self-training. The course of this self-training which culminates in Buddhahood, includes self-discipline, selfrestraint, superhuman effort, firm determination, and willingness to undergo any kind of suffering for the sake of other living beings who are suffering in this world.

This clearly shows that the Buddha did not obtain his supreme enlightenment by simply praying, worshipping, or making offerings to some supernatural beings. He attained Buddhahood by the purification of his mind and heart. He gained supreme enlightenment without the influence of any external supernatural forces but by the development of his own insight. Thus, only a man who has firm determination and courage to overcome all hindrances, weaknesses and selfish desires can attain Buddhahood.

The Buddha had a natural birth; he lived in a normal way. But he was an extraordinary man, as far as his enlightenment was concerned. Those who have not learnt to appreciate his supreme wisdom, try to explain his greatness by peeping into his life and looking for miracles. However, the Buddha's supreme enlightenment is more than enough for us to understand his greatness. There is no need to show his greatness by introducing any miraculous power. Every supernatural power becomes natural when people come to know how it takes place.



harma means truth, that which really is; it also means law — the law which exists in a man's own heart and mind;

it is the principle of righteousness; therefore, the Buddha advises to man to be noble, pure and worthy of honour. Dharma, this law of righteousness, exists not only in a man's heart and mind, but it exists in the universe also. The etymological meaning of the word is 'that which upholds or supports', therefore Dharma is every principle on which the cosmos operates.

The entire universe is an embodiment or revelation of the Dharma. The law of nature which modern science has discovered is the revelations of Dharma, for Dharma is that law within the universe which makes matter act in the way studied in physics, chemistry, zoology, botany and astronomy. Dharma exists in the universe just as gravity, wind and heat. The teaching of the Buddha is called Dharma because he explained how natural occurrences take place according to worldly conditions and universal law.

Ethics, science and philosophy are delicately interwoven into a system, which is divorced from mythology and which attempts to unravel the real nature of life.

There is no aspect of the Buddha-Dharma, or the Buddhist teachings, which does not stem from the logical and rational foundations of that philosophy. The Buddha Dharma is to pave the way for final salvation by leading a noble life.

Buddhism may be defined as a way of life, called the Noble Eightfold Path, leading to a goal called Nirvana. This goal or deliverance is the state of supreme good, because it is free from defects, and has ultimate peace, purity, and the highest happiness that our minds can conceive. Yet, it is something, which cannot be conferred by another person, however exalted he or she may be, but must be won by one's own effort. Buddhism teaches the principle that everything in the world comes on account of something else. There is no first event or first cause.

Life and universal laws

According to the Buddha, what human beings need for happiness and liberation are not mere religious beliefs, rituals or mass theories, but the knowledge of the Dharma: universal nature or cosmic nature and complete harmony with the law of cause and effect. Until this principle is fully understood, life is only an imperfect and unpredictable manifestation of its own nature.

The essence of the Dharma

In its most basic formulation, the essence of the Dharma, the Buddha's teaching, is *sila*,

samadhi and panna — moral discipline, mental development and enlightenment.

Three characteristics in everything

The three characteristics of everything in this universe are clearly explained only in Buddhism.

Buddhism is the by-product of Dharma

They are the impermanency of everything, the unsatisfactoriness of everything, and the impersonality or insubstantiality of everything. This is the most remarkable discovery of the Buddha. But due to ignorance and craving, there are very few people who can comprehend such a lofty and sublime teaching.

The wheel of existence and suffering

It is evident that the world is full of various kinds of sufferings, such as decay, sorrow, lamentation, pain, despair and death. The Buddha pointed out that birth (*jati*) brings forth sufferings. If there is no birth, there is no scope for suffering.

Q: Why is there birth?

A: The sub-conscious process of becoming (*bhava*) as a combination of mind and body (*nama-rupa*) causes birth. In other words, where there is bhava, there is birth.

Q: What leads to the formation of the

combination mind and body?

A: Clinging (*upadana*) leads to the mind-body combination.

Q: What leads to clinging?

A: Craving (tanha) leads to clinging.

Q: What produces craving?

A: Craving is produced by sensations or feeling (*vedana*).

Q: What generates feeling?

A: It is the contact (*phassa*) — of the senses with their objects — which generates feeling.

Q: What causes contact?

A: The six sense-bases (*salayatana*) are the causes of contact.

Q: How do the six sense-bases come into being?

A: Psycho-physical combination (*nama-rupa*) brings forth the six sense-bases.

Q: How does psycho-physical combination come into being?

A: With the appearance of inactive or passive consciousness (*vinnana* or *vipaka citta*) the psycho-physical combination comes into being.

Q: How does passive consciousness appear?

A: It is the outcome of latent Karmic energies (*sankhara*).



ur belief in some power beyond the world is as old as the human race. Different religions have given this

belief enduring substance, and spawned a rich diversity of ritual and ceremony. While theologians debate religious truths, great philosophers attempt to understand our physical world, grappling with logic in their search for knowledge and certainty.

The word 'religion' has no one generally accepted definition. Philosophers, sociologists, psychologists, theologians and many others interested in a particular aspect of life, have all defined religion in their own ways and for their own purposes.

However, the main purpose of every religion is to teach people how to lead a respectable and harmless life and to find out their liberation from physical and mental suffering.

Religions are meant for the emancipation of living beings. Religions are not mere subjects of study and essay writing, but are practical modes of conduct in the grooming of human beings

externally in matters of the mundane and internally in things that concern the inner spirit. Religion must be experienced at the very source of its beginning and lived in utter abandonment, through all phases of change to attain a spirituality and inner growth.

Among all the great founders of religions, it was the Buddha alone who encouraged the spirit of investigation among his followers. He advised them not to accept even his teachings with blind faith and without thorough impartial investigation. Therefore, it is no exaggeration to say that Buddhism can be called a religion of science. Whatever scientists have discovered so far, they has never gone against the teachings of the Buddha.

Buddhism is truly a religion suited to the modern, scientific world. The light, which comes from nature, from science, from history, from human experience, from every point of the universe, is radiant with the Noble Teachings of the Buddha.

Religion is a system of education

Religion is, among many other things, a system of education, by means of which human beings may train themselves, first to make desirable changes in their own personalities and in society, and, to heighten consciousness and so establish more adequate relations between themselves and the universe of which they are parts.

A religion of freedom

The freedom that the followers of the Buddha enjoy is commendable. In fact, many Buddhists have not even realised this themselves. They have full freedom to judge and to think for themselves whether to accept or to reject anything.

They are not bound to accept anything in the name of religion, either simply by thinking of the greatness of a particular religious teacher, or, by thinking that it is their bounden duty to accept the words of holy scriptures, or, the ways of

ancient traditions.

Buddhists are at liberty to investigate for themselves and accept or reject any proposition in accordance with their own conviction, based on reason.

Purpose of religion

Annihilation of all greed, Extinction of all hatred, Cessation of all ignorance. Cultivation of virtue and wisdom.

Different aspects of religion

Personal Religion means the inward veneration of one's religious teacher or teachers and the application of one's moral principles in one's daily life, without participating in the showy manifestations of the organised religion of the masses. The intellectually liberated belong to this category.

Organised or Institutionalised Religion is the popularly practised religion of the masses, with much pomp, many ceremonies, processions and public worship. Temple festivals are typical examples of institutionalised religion.

Intellectuals are not very much interested in this kind of religion, but the broad masses are really interested in it.

Buddhism satisfies all religious needs: to the intellectual classes, it gives a lofty philosophy and moral teachings that lead to enlightenment and liberation from all sufferings; to the common person, it gives a focal point for worship and the hope of a better life hereafter.

Revealed Religion is said to be 'revealed' by 'God' through a prophet or special messenger of a God. Christianity, Judaism and Islam are regarded as revealed religions. Adherents of those religions, regard them as the only true religions.

They are monotheistic religions, believing in one God. Catholicism, however, has yielded to the popular and more natural demand for more

gods, by introducing the belief in the intercession of the 'Mother of God' and their Saints, the worship or adoration of the relics of the Saints, and still many other ways of approaching God and obtaining what one wants without having to ask directly from the 'One God'.

Natural Religion the worship of natural phenomena and forces, is said to have been inspired by the aspect of Nature. The first form of natural religion might have been really inspired by the awe experienced in the presence of strong natural phenomena, such as sun, moon, mountains, rivers, sea, earthquakes, thunderstorms, floods, and any violent changes in one's environment.

It is fear and desire to win the favour of the powers behind the natural phenomena, which gave rise to the belief in gods, souls, spirits and mighty divine beings, and the possibility of incurring their displeasure or winning their favour.

Ancestor worship is a form of religion which leads to the worship of ancestors or the First Man, or

a God, who is supposed to have been the originator of the imperial family and of all men. The Japanese and the Chinese, who are not considered as Buddhists or adherents of other systems are the adherents of this kind of religion.

Psychological Religion is occupied with the study of the nature of human soul and its relation to God. Though the Hindus declare that their religion is one revealed by God or successive incarnations of God, their religion is often described as a Psychological Religion that mixed with Natural Religion.

Buddhism as a religion

Buddhism is not a message or something revealed by a supernatural divine being. Buddhism is the Dharma or universal phenomena understood by the Buddha through his enlightenment. Dharma is to understand the nature of life and worldly conditions and to train oneself by leading a righteous way of life and also to gain mental

tranquillity, wisdom and finally deliverance from physical and mental sufferings.

Buddhism and atheism

Though free thinkers and atheists at times, acclaim the Buddha as one of their own, yet Buddhism is not an Atheistic Teaching, if the word 'atheism' is used in a derogatory sense of reproach and condemnation. Buddhism does not waste time in fighting against belief in God or gods. When rightly understood, it supersedes all theistic as well as atheistic doctrines.

Humans without a religion are difficult to govern

A government cannot control human beings merely by imposing more and more rigid rules. The more the government makes rules, the more the people would find loopholes to break them. If man were morally trained by a religion which makes him understand why he should behave as a good

citizen, no problems would arise.

Unlike human beings, animals have no politics or government, religion or education, but yet maintain themselves without facing many difficulties among themselves. What would be the situation among human beings, if they were allowed to live without any government, religion or education?

Allergy to other religions

To the followers of some religions, all other religions are to be avoided as if they are some contagious diseases.

By abusing another's religion one damages one's own religion

One should not honour only one's own religion and condemn the religions of others, but one should honour others' religions for this or that reason. In so doing, one helps one's own religion to grow and renders service to the religions of others too. In acting otherwise, one digs the grave

of one's own religion and also does harm to other religions. Whosoever honours his own religion and condemns other religions, does so indeed through devotion to his own religion, thinking, "I will glorify my own religion." But on the contrary, in so doing he injures his own religion more gravely. So concord is good. Let all listen, and be willing to listen to the doctrines professed by others.

Why some people regard the followers of other religions as their enemies

- Why is it that sometimes the followers of one religious group treat another religious group as rivals?
- Why are they reluctant to show their smiling faces to other religionists?
- Why are they sometimes hostile to others and why do they refuse even to co-operate with their good work?
- Why do some insult other religious people by

calling them names?

Such people must understand that the coreligionists are also working for human welfare and do not wish to harm or mislead the public.

There cannot be only one religion

Religionists must come together and work with each other. Mahatma Gandhi once said, "I do not expect the India of my dream to develop one religion, to be wholly Hindu, Christian or wholly Muslim, but I want it to be wholly tolerant with its religions working side by side with one another."

People may cheat the government but not religion

People may cheat the government but not religion. One who tries to cheat religion cheats oneself. Discipline cannot be brought out by coercion and compulsion or by science, but by sincerely following a religion, which stands for peace, purity and happiness.

The weakness of a religion cannot be inferred by observing what people practise One should not judge the merits or demerits of a religion simply by watching certain ill-conceived practices and beliefs adopted by illiterate people in the name of religion.

The original teachings of the great teachers are open to everybody and must be examined before criticism is made.

How people misunderstand religion

Irreligion is sometimes propagated under the garment of religion. Many people think religion is to be found only in a place of worship and a guru. Many people regard religion as suitable for old folks or women but not for the youths, educated or rich people.

To them religion can only be found within the covers of some musty books but not among the flowers that bloom so freshly in the fields. These ideas are the results of their negligence, laziness and misunderstanding of religion.

No righteous anger in Buddhism

In Buddhism, there is no such thing as righteous indignation or righteous anger; Buddhism never tried to justify war under any circumstances. There was no nervous irritability or emotion or anger in the Buddha's mind just because some people did not pay attention to him.

Respect those who are worthy of respect

As Buddhists, we can respect and honour the founders and teachers of other religions. All religious teachers deserve respect and honour, for they also have done good service to mankind. If we like, we also can keep pictures or symbols of these religious teachers in our homes. Buddhism advises us to honour those who are worthy of honour.

Buddhism influenced Indian life in a hundred ways, as it was bound to, for it must be remembered

that it was a living, dynamic, and wide-spread religion in India for over a thousand years.

Some religions encourage war

How to prove the progress of a religion?

We cannot show the progress of a religion simply by erecting big buildings as places of worship, or by making huge images, or through various functions and ceremonies, or organising some colourful and attractive religious activities to bring more and more people into religion.

But we can show the progress of a religion according to the behaviour of the followers of the religion, how they convince others through their decent life and kindness, sincerity, harmless and unblamable life.

Who is a religious man?

In the eyes of the Buddha, a religious man is one who is leading a noble life. Such a person can be a follower of any religion or even a person without any religious label.

Yet, if such a person could purify his mind from various defilements or evil thoughts, then he will be able to enjoy a happy, peaceful, contented life and finally attain everlasting happiness.

It is not easy for a person to prove that he is more religious than others, just because he worships and prays so many times a day or by making offerings in the name of a god or a religious teacher.

We believe that the only way to be religious is by following noble principles to develop the moral and spiritual aspects of our life without harming others.

Who is the sinner?

It is a sin to call a man a sinner.

Theistic and humanistic religion

Theistic religions worship supernatural powers. Humanistic religions worship human goodness. They say: Human virtues are more powerful than divine power. Buddhism recognises the divinity of humans and goodness within human nature.

The wise one sees only good things in every religion

Like the bee gathers honey from different flowers, the wise one sees only the good in all religions and accepts the essence of the different teachings.

For example:

- Buddhism says, "Hurt not others in ways that you yourself would find hurtful."
- Taoism says, "Regard your neighbour's gain as your own gain, and your neighbour's loss as your own loss."
- Christianity says, "All things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them."

- Islam says, "Do unto all men as you would they do unto you, and reject others that you would reject for yourself."
- Hinduism says, "Let no one do to others what he would not have done to himself."

Where religions originate

All the other religions begin in heaven and descend to earth, like the stalactite.

Buddhism begins on earth and ascends up to heaven, like the stalagmite.

Comparison between Buddhism and Christianity

- Christianity is theocentric, as it is centred around the concept of God; while Buddhism is anthropocentric, as it is centred around the concept of man.
- For the Christian, religion has come down from Heaven to earth to fulfil the purpose of the Creator; for the Buddhist, religion has grown

- up on earth to fulfil a human need, to solve a human problem.
- For the Christian, man is the image of God in imperfect form, which God creates and attempts to perfect through the practice of religion; for the Buddhist, God is the image of man in perfect form, which man conceives and attempts to realise, through the practice of religion.
- For the Christian, Christ is God become man, the 'Anthropomorphic God'; for the Buddhist, the Buddha is man become God (Brahma bhuto), the 'Theopsychic Man'.
- For the Christian, the practice of religion is co-operation with God to satisfy his divine purpose; for the Buddhist, the practice of religion is the fulfilment of a human need to overcome evil, suffering and ignorance, by transcending human weakness.
- For the Christian, the practice is based on the belief in God and his plan; for the Buddhist, the practice is based on an understanding of the problem of human existence and its

solution through an inner transformation.



arma (*Sanskrit*) and Kamma (*Pali*) is the principle that all good and bad actions have consequences that will affect one

throughout life, and even in future lives. By extension, karma is sometimes loosely used to mean fate, or destiny. Man is the architect of his own fate, and he will reap what he sows.

Thus, the material and mental forces combine and recombine with no underlying substance or soul to make them permanent, and this process of becoming, the wheel of life, continues indefinitely unless its cause, craving or selfish desire for existence, is totally extinguished. It is this desire, which sets the wheel of life in motion, and it is manifested in action, which is in reality volition or will-power. Volitional action is responsible for the creation of a being.

Every action produces an effect; cause comes first and effect afterwards. We therefore may say that karma is the 'law of cause and effect', and that man because of his actions is the master of his own destiny, child of his past and parent of his future.

The law of karma explains why each

How Karma is Created

individual has a unique mental disposition, a unique physical appearance and unique response to experiences. These are the various effects of the countless actions that each individual had performed in the past and which are stored as mental habits.

At the root of man's trouble is his primal state of ignorance, and from ignorance arises desire, which sets the karmic force in motion. According to the law of karma, the tragedy of inequality in creation itself, falls short of any reasonableness. For instance the sadness of the spastic child and the sadness of the deaf and dumb, cannot easily be accommodated in the concept of a Compassionate Creator.

The Law of Cause and Effect is a logical and a reasonable explanation of the tragedy that is creation itself. The universal law of karma throws a challenge and helps one to become the means to control one's own fate.

Just as the law of this country does not make exceptions for certain categories of people so the law of karma does not exclude people on account of their intellect or other characteristics.

Karma and rebirth account for many of our existing problems

- They account for the suffering for which we ourselves are responsible.
- They explain the inequality of mankind.
- They account for the arising of geniuses and child prodigies.
- They explain why identical twins who are physically alike, enjoying equal privileges, exhibit totally different characteristics, mentally, intellectually and morally.
- They account for the dissimilarities amongst children of the same family although heredity may account for the similarities.
- They account for special abilities of men by their parental tendencies.
- They account for the normal and intellectual differences between parents and children.
- They explain how infants spontaneously develop such passions as greed, anger and jealousy.
- They account for instinctive likes and dislikes at first sight.

How Karma is Created

- They explain how in us is found 'a rubbish heap of evil and treasure of good'.
- They account for the unexpected outbursts of passion in a highly civilised person, and for the sudden transformation of a criminal into a saint.
- They explain how profligates are born to saintly parents and saintly children to profligates.
- They explain how we are the result of what we were, we will be the result of what we are; in other words, we are not absolutely what we were, and will not be absolutely what we are.
- They explain the causes of untimely deaths, and unexpected changes in fortune.
- Above all, they account for the arising of omniscient, perfect spiritual teachers like the Buddhas who possess incomparable physical, mental and intellectual characteristics, which can be explained only by karma and rebirth.

A single life is not enough to prepare for one's salvation

"If a single life here decides the whole course of the future, then why does one life last only for a few weeks, and another for 70 or 80 years?"

For one thing, the person who lives only a few weeks, risks less chance of eternal damnation than does the person who lives up to 80 years. The person who lives only a few weeks cannot fully develop and mature his intelligence and understanding. He does not encounter all the pitfalls and the temptations that life abounds with.

How Karma is Created

Karma and the electric light

Just as an electric light is the outward manifestation of invisible electric energy, even so are living beings the outward manifestation of invisible karmic energy. The bulb may break and the light may be extinguished, but the current remains and the light may be reproduced in another bulb. The bulb can be compared to the parental cell of the body and the electric energy to the karmic energy.

In the same way, the karmic force remains undisturbed by the disintegration of the physical body, and the passing away of the present consciousness leads to the arising of a fresh one in another birth

Karma has neither beginning nor end

If we understand karma as a force or a form of energy, then we can discern no beginning. To ask where is the beginning of karma is like asking where is the beginning of electricity. Karma

like electricity does not 'begin'. It 'comes into being' under certain conditions.

Conventionally, we say that the origin of karma is volition but this is as much conventional as saying that the origin of a river is a mountain top. But when you attain enlightenment, your karma exhausts (*kammakkhaya*). Therefore an individual's karma has no beginning but it has an end.

Three premonitory visions of the dying man

Suppose a person is about to die. This critical stage may be compared to the flickering of a lamp just before it is extinguished. To this dying man, the present karma or some good or bad actions committed either during his lifetime or immediately before his dying moment may cause a *karma nimitta* or *gati nimitta* to appear in the mind of the dying man.

Karma nimitta is a symbol or a mental reproduction of any sight, sound, smell, taste, touch or idea, which dominated his activity

How Karma is Created

during his lifetime. Thus a butcher may see a vision of knives or dying animals. A kind physician may see his patients coming to him. A devotee may see an object of worship, etc.

A gati nimitta is a 'symbol of destiny' or a sign of the place where the rebirth is to occur. Such a symbol frequently presents itself to the dying person. Such premonitory visions of destiny may take various forms such as a fire, forests, mountainous regions, a mother's womb, celestial mansions, etc. When these indications of the future birth occur, and if they are bad, they might at times be remedied.

Rebirth takes place immediately irrespective of the place of birth, just as an electro-magnetic wave that is projected into space is immediately reproduced in a receiving radio set. Rebirth of the mental flux is also instantaneous and leaves no room whatever for any intermediate state (antarabhava).

The Buddha-word does not support the belief that a spirit of the deceased person takes lodgement in some temporary state until it finds

a suitable place for its birth. According to certain beliefs there is an intermediate state where beings remain for one to seven weeks until the forty-ninth day. This view is contrary to the teachings of the Buddha.

Those who remember their previous births Some people remember their previous births, but many others are unable to do so especially the following persons:

- Children who die young.
- Those who die old and senile.
- Those who are strongly addicted to drugs or intoxicants.
- Those whose mothers, during conception, have been sickly or have had to toil laboriously, or have been reckless or imprudent during pregnancy
- The foetuses in the womb, being stunned and startled, lose all knowledge of their past existence.

How Karma is Created

Cause and effect instead of rewards and punishments

Buddhists believe in a just rationale of karma that operates automatically and speaks in terms of cause and effect instead of rewards and punishments.

Intentional actions create karma

Monks, I say that intention is karma. When one intends, one acts by deed, Word or thought.

The purpose of explaining karma

The Buddhist doctrine of karma did not expound fatalistic views. Nor did it vindicate a post-mortem justice.

The Buddha, who had no selfish motives, did not teach this law of karma to protect the rich and comfort the poor by promising illusory happiness in an after-life.

The law of causation

Buddhism teaches that consciousness is not a property of matter and life, is not a mere result of change produced by chemical or electric forces, but is a result of the Law of Causation.



Criticism is a dangerous spark — a spark that is liable to ignite an explosion in the powder magazine of pride — an explosion that sometimes hastens death.

Socrates of Athens was a brilliant man in spite of the fact that he went about barefooted and married a girl of nineteen when he was bald-headed and forty.

He did something that only a handful of men in all history have been able to do; he sharply changed the whole course of human thought; and now, twenty-five centuries after his death, he is honoured as one of the wisest persuaders who influenced this wrangling world.

His method? Did he tell people they were wrong? Oh no, not Socrates. He was far too adroit for that. His whole technique, now called the 'Socratic method', was based upon getting a 'yes, yes' response. He asked questions with which his opponents would have to agree. He kept on winning one admission after another until he had an armful of 'yeses'. He kept on asking questions until finally, almost without realising it, his opponent found himself embracing a conclusion that he would have bitterly denied a few minutes previously. The next time we are smarting to tell a man he is wrong, let us remember barefooted old Socrates and ask a gentle question — a question that will get the 'yes, yes' response.

The Chinese have a proverb with the age-old wisdom of the changeless east: "He who treads softly goes far." They have spent five thousand years studying human nature, and they have treasured a lot of perspicacity: "He who treads softly goes far."

How they allocated charity box collections





n the hierarchy of the inhabitants of the planetary system, of which the earth is a part, the position of the human being

is relatively high, however insignificant he is in the universe in respect of numbers. It is only by being a human, can one gather wisdom. An animal cannot acquire wisdom, because food and self-preservation are its only concern.

If one is born in hell, undergoing intensive suffering, chances of mental development and cultivation of mind are poor. In the heavenly abodes, the deities have too much comfort, which does not help them to think and prepare for the next existence. 



ature involves our natural surroundings. It includes trees, birds, bacteria, clouds, wind, rocks, stars, etc. It also

includes sounds we can hear, heat that we can feel, gravity that pulls us to the earth. In short, it includes everything and anything that is 'natural', that is, not made by anybody.

In the early history of mankind the natural environment was the source for food and shelter. Natural materials were used to fashion tools and natural fires were tamed to provide heat and light. The calls of animals could indicate danger or mere contentment and man learned to know the difference because life depended on a large part upon such knowledge.

Lightning and thunder were frightening until their nature was understood. Man was curious about his surroundings and tried to find out just how ordinary rocks or minerals might be changed to precious metals such as gold and silver. Much of what was in part observed, and in part-imagined, became folklore, and various sayings about the weather were passed from

generation to generation. When a written language was developed much of what had been passed by word of mouth became a written record and many aspects of nature were included in such writings. The great religious leaders found that the use of common place knowledge about nature could be made the basis of their moral and ethical lessons.

More and more people are growing aware of our dwindling natural resources. Thus, there is added impetus to the hope that an understanding and love of nature will bring about a public opinion that will safeguard and conserve our resources, so that our future generations can have much to study and enjoy in our natural environment.

Buddhism has always been associated with nature. The Buddha was born under a tree and gained enlightenment under a tree and spent many hours in the seclusion of jungles. He even passed away under the shade of two trees.

He always extolled the great benefit to be derived from association with nature. He discouraged the destruction of plants and animals for the pleasure.

What is nature?

Nature is made up of conflicting processes and forces. Socrates said that nature is not an accidental chaos as the previous sophists had thought but is rather an ordered array of interacting agencies, which on the whole support one another. Thus each part of the human organism serves the other and benefits the whole.

Panca Niyama Dharma – Fivefold Law or natural order of existence

- Utu Niyama: refers to the physical, inorganic order. This order includes such phenomena as the seasonal winds and rains, the unerring sequence of the four seasons, characteristic seasonal changes and events, the causes of wind and rains, the nature of heat, etc.
- Bija Niyama: refers to the physical organic order.
 This order includes such phenomena as germs and seeds: How rice is produced from rice seed, how sugar taste results from sugar cane or honey, the peculiar characteristics of certain fruits, etc. The scientific theory of cells and genes

- and the physical similarity of twins may be ascribed to this order.
- Karma Niyama: refers to the order of action (condition) and result. This natural law states that desirable and undesirable acts produce corresponding good and bad results. As surely as water seeks its own level, so does karma, given opportunity, produce its inevitable result not in the form of reward or punishment but as an innate sequence. This sequence of cause and effect is as natural and necessary as the way of the sun and the moon.
- Dharma Niyama: refers to the order of the norm; e.g. the natural phenomena occurring at the advent of a Bodhisatva in his last birth, gravitation and other similar laws of nature. Morality and so forth may be included in this group.
- Citta Niyama: refers to the order of the mind or psychic laws. This order includes such phenomena as processes of consciousness, constituents of consciousness, power of mind, etc. All psychic phenomena, which are

inexplicable to modern science, are included in this order: telepathy, telesthesia, retrocognition, premonition, clairvoyance, clairaudience, thought reading, etc.



As a mother, the woman was definitely honoured and revered and her position in society was unassailable.

In the next millennium, women will play an increasingly important role in the development of society. It is necessary for us to prepare them for that role by giving them equal opportunities to participate in every field of human endeavour. At the same time, however, women must not see the bringing up of a family as degrading. The traditional role of a mother as a caregiver must never be abandoned. 





o most people a wealthy person, community or nation is one that is 'well off' or 'rich' in the sense of possessing

those things which contribute to material welfare. The word 'wealth' originally meant state of well being (weal) but by usage became more and more to refer to those things which generally promote physical well-being rather than the state of mental well-being itself. This wealth consists of an aggregation of substantive things, which contribute to well-being, and these things are called economic goods. In modern economies, the ownership of wealth has become more indirect and is often represented by stocks, bonds and other such instruments of ownership.

Wealth, therefore, is often thought of as consisting of these instruments, their money value, or even money itself. Because the Buddha emphasised the necessity to reduce greed and to practice renunciation, people wrongly conclude that Buddhism condemns the accumulation of wealth. This is certainly untrue. The Buddha recognised that not everyone in society has developed enough spirituality to turn his or her back on materialism

and take on the life of a monk or nun. In his teaching, notably the Sigalovada Sutra and the Vyaggapaja Sutra, the Buddha gives sound advice on how wealth can be accumulated and dispensed with, to encourage charity, aid to relatives, thrift and generosity.

What Buddhism discourages however, is the total slavery to materialism. Sadly in many developed and developing societies, wealth is sought after as the ultimate goal, not as a means to promote spiritual upliftment. When a person pursues wealth at the expense of all other consideration, then it is wrong. On a national level, when governments are prepared to destroy the environment in the name of progress the citizens lose their confidence in life.

According to Buddhism wealth can be acquired, but one must use it in the service of one's family and the less fortunate beings.

Success is a related concept. We can be successful in anything we do materially. But we should never lose sight of spiritual success. Once we know that material success is subservient to spiritual progress we can seek both with

understanding.

It is emphasised that we should repeat the following sentences several times daily: —

"I can be a success, I will be a success, I am a success."

On waking up in the morning, one should repeat these sentences several times. Before retiring at night, one should go through the routine again. These three sentences cover the three phases of success already outlined.

The thought: 'I can be a success' is the phase of *RECOGNITION*. You recognise that you can be a success.

"I will be a success." represent the phase of *REALISATION*. You realise that right thinking will bring you success – and since you are determined to think rightly, you know you will be a success. This of course applies to both material and spiritual success.



ar is a violent conflict between states. Though the word is used to describe other types of conflict — civil war,

class war, etc. — war is an aspect of politics. Much of man's oral and written records, perhaps as much of it as is devoted to any other human problems, deal with war. Groups of men used their hunting weapons against other men long before the dawn of history. For centuries man regarded war as an inevitable part of his fate, like his struggles with the weather, disease or the mysterious ocean.

One of the greatest novelist, Leo Tolstoy (1828 – 1910) wrote *War and Peace* in 1885 to exemplify the individual's fate by submissively performing the cruel, gloomy, irksome and in human role assigned to him by destiny.

There has not been and never will be real happiness in the world, without peace. Buddhism, above all, teaches the law of cause and effect. Peace is no exception. Peace comes primarily by the absence of war; it is a result, an end, not an instrument. It does not come by mere wishfulness or prayer. It has to be obtained by

effort, by weaving the principles of righteousness into the whole fabric of human relationships.

The opposite of peace is conflict or war, which according to the Buddha, is the cause of all our unhappiness.

War is the result of tension, which is of various kinds. There are international tensions, some of which come down to us as historic legacies. We have also economic tensions between the haves and the have-nots. These manifold tensions create fear, suspicion, hatred and vindictiveness.

A man's individual life, circumstances and world are a reflection of his own thoughts and beliefs. All men are mirrors reflecting according to their own surface. All men, looking at the world of men and things, are looking into a mirror, which gives back their own reflection. It was R.L. Stevenson who once said:

"There is so much good in the worst of us, And so much bad in the best of us, That it ill-behoves any one of us, To find any fault with the rest of us."

Even a rose has flaws. But why examine the flaws when you can appreciate its beauty? Bolton Hall once remarked:

"I looked at my Brother with the Microscope of Criticism,
And I said: "How coarse my Brother is!"
I looked at him through the
Telescope of Scorn
And I said: "How small my Brother is!"
Then I looked in the Mirror of Truth
And I said: "How like me my Brother is."

Each individual lives in an individual world of his own creation. Man is false and deceitful, not merely in relation to others, but to himself as well. The remarkable thing about man is that he often deceives himself. "As we think, so we act."

"Since it is in the minds of men that wars are created, it is in the minds of men that the fortresses of peace must be erected."

This preamble to the UNESCO Charter reminds us that war begins in the minds of men. The Buddha made the same remark, many centuries earlier which is enshrined, in the first verse of the Dharmapada. In fact, he went much further than that; and declared that all things good and bad have their origin in the mind.

Who destroys the world?

The age old myth that many people believed for thousands of years that God or the devil can destroy this world is refuted by the realisation that man is the one who puts the world in flames and can eliminate the whole of mankind from this earth. However, still there are people on this earth who are sane enough to understand the danger that mankind is facing today.

The cause of conflict is nothing but selfish craving



ove, universal love, is the remedy for all the ills that afflict mankind. One of the most beautiful sayings about the

supreme virtue of *Maitri* mentions mother-love, the foundation of all love in the world, in the *Metta Sutta*:—

"As a mother at the risk of her life protects her own child, So also let everyone cultivate goodwill towards all beings."

The late Dr Ian D Suttie, in his deeply interesting and thought-provoking book, *The Origin of Love and Hate*, expressed the conclusion to which his psychological researches had brought him that the energy of human personality is a will-to-love or a will-to-fellow-ship. Dr Suttie saw this energy revealed in its simplest and purest form in a baby at its mother's breast. There, said Dr Suttie, was the freedom of perfect reciprocity; the mother and child, both participating in an activity wherein neither felt exalted and neither debased, neither conferring a

favour nor accepting an obligation; but both alike rejoicing in the blessedness of mutual love. It is a spiritual truth that evil may only be overcome by its opposite — goodness, according to the *Dhammapada*.

Love is the antidote for hatred, and goodwill for anger; the presence of one implies the absence of the other. Anger, on the other hand, is defined as an attitude, which wants to generate violence. an agitation against something either animate or inanimate. If we look at a person, a situation or some object and do not like it and we want to express some violence and agitation towards it, to make it change in a violent way, this is a state of intolerance and a lack of patience combined with a wish to harm whatever it is that we cannot endure. Its opposite on the one hand is patience, which repels intolerance, and on the other it is love, and because love is the opposite of wishing to harm someone else. Usually we get angry at situations in which a thing happens to us which we do not like, and because they do not come up to our expectations, we get very angry with them.

Virtues beautify the body





eople typically consider friendship a voluntary or freely chosen relationship. This is in contrast to family, who are

not freely chosen, or interactions with people at work which are not voluntary. Humans are by nature social beings. But this is not by choice; it is a matter of survival. These friendly interactions make people feel that their presence is valued. Friendship is seen as an equity relationship, where the norm is that what a friend does for you needs to be reciprocated in some form as gratitude.

Spending time together means that friends seek out each other's company. Nevertheless, while friends wish to spend time together, friendship is typically not experienced as exclusive, such as romantic relationship. Companionship, on the other hand, means having someone to do and share things with and to be of service in times of need. This is an obvious benefit of friendship. Emotional support from friends often takes the form of gratitude, moral support, and may occur in both mundane and crisis situations.

Friendship gives Confidence

Some friendships are of long duration, while others are relatively brief. Research has found that two-thirds of older persons have had friendships that lasted throughout their life.

As people age, their needs for social support may increase as they are confronted with mobility, health and stamina difficulties. At the same time, the death and retirement, movements of friends may reduce the size of their social network. Having friends seems to make a diffeence in people's lives. It may foster self-esteem, providing services to the needy, promoting social competence and inhibit loneliness.

According to the Buddha, we must seek out good spiritual friends who will support us as we strive to attain perfection. These friends will point out our weakness without rancour and encourage us in our practice of the Buddha's teachings. Friends like these do not expect anything in return and are only concerned with our welfare. We in return treat them in the same way and we work for our mutual benefit.



eath is the cessation of life processes that eventually occurs in all-living organisms. The state of death has always

been obscured by mystery and superstition. The precise definition of human death remains controversial and differs according to traditional beliefs.

Human beings have more fear on death. They also cannot understand that one day they have to face death. That is why they worry unnecessarily about it. Death is universal and it strikes all and spares none. Sorrow is the heritage of everyone. The Buddha explained that death is to be expected as a natural phenomenon in all living beings.

No death without birth

One day the Buddha advised Ananda, "If anybody should ask the question as to why death takes place, tell them that death takes place because of birth. If there is no birth then there is no death. If you try to prevent death by force, then you do not understand nature. You are in fact going against the laws of nature."

The setting sun in one country becomes the rising sun in another country. So a setting sun is not the end of the sun. In the same manner, death itself is not the end of a life.

Death is the beginning of a life. Birth brings the death certificate. So if we want to avoid death, we must prevent birth.

Do something for others

Death is no cause for sorrow, but it would be sorrow if one dies without having done something for oneself and for the world.

Samsara - the repeated birth and death

The constant succession of birth and death of each individual life-flux is technically known as

Death is not the End of Life

samsara. Samsara is the recurrent wandering of the life-flux in the ocean of birth and death.

This life-stream or *samsara* flows *ad infinitum*, as long as the muddy waters of ignorance and craving feed it. When these two are completely cut off, then only does the life-stream cease to flow; then rebirth ends, as in the case of Buddha's and Arahants'. The ultimate beginning of this life-stream cannot be determined, as a stage cannot be perceived when this life force was not fraught with ignorance and craving.

The rounds of rebirths or *samsara* do not automatically come to an end. Nor is there any point at which all beings revolving in *samsara*, gain their release by reason of its ceasing, for it has no temporal boundaries.

To run away from death

Struggle for survival means trying to run away from death. There is no life without death and there is no death without life.

Life without death can be a burden

If there were no death, life would become stagnant, monotonous, unspeakably burdensome and boring.

If man were given the insight to realise and know the time of his death, he would definitely act differently from what he is doing presently. Death is only physiological erosion of the human body.

In memory of the departed

When Prophet Mohammed was asked what one must do in memory of departed parents, he advised the questioner to dig a well for people to drink water to quench their thirst.
